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1. Practice 7 days.....**3 bricks**
2. Compose your own song, with title and special ending.....**5 bricks**
3. Perform for anyone outside of your family.....**2 bricks**
4. Create a different ending to a lesson book song.....**2 bricks**
5. Memorize a lesson book song.....**3 bricks**
6. Play a song by ear.....**2 bricks**
7. Complete 10 minutes of Classical Music Listening.....**4 bricks**
8. Play ALL your scales *flawlessly* in a row.....**4 bricks**
9. Beat your high score in Flashnote Derby App.....**2 bricks**
10. Complete assigned theory pages with *no mistakes*.....**1 brick**
11. Composer Notebook Pages (described below).....**5 bricks**
12. Go ahead to the next song in the lesson book.....**1 brick**
13. Win a concept game in the lesson.....**1 brick**
14. Play for memory any previous recital song.....**2 bricks**
15. Successfully sight-read during the lesson.....**2 bricks**

\*There will be additional chances to build bricks during specific lessons at the discretion of the teacher.  
Ex. Performing each lesson book song exceptionally well, excellent hand position, etc.

**GRAND PRIZE:** Student with the MOST bricks on his page.

\*\*Composer Notebook Pages:
